

The Bayfield Area Trails (BAT) Committee Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

I. Background: The Bayfield Area of northwestern Wisconsin is valued by residents and visitors for its natural beauty, cultural history, and outdoor recreational opportunities on land and water. We respectfully acknowledge that this region is the traditional homeland of the Anishinaabe people, also known as the Chippewa or Ojibwe, who have stewarded this land throughout the generations. Among the land-based recreational opportunities is enjoying trails of all kinds including non-motorized (hiking, Nordie skiing, snowshoeing), mechanized (year-round biking), and motorized (snowmobiling, ATV/UTV). Area residents also use these trails for transportation and health benefits. Trails help build appreciation of the natural world, indigenous traditions, and cultural history. While there are many existing trails for these activities, they are not well connected, nor is there adequate capacity to maintain and manage them. In the spring of 2019, recognizing the needs and benefits of enhancing multiple-use trails, a core group of representatives from local governments and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in and around Bayfield convened to explore collaboration toward common goals.

This non-binding MOU is intended to serve as a guide to the understandings of the cooperative roles of participating entities in promoting the mission, vision, goals, and objectives expressed in this memorandum. This MOU is not intended to alter the existing authority, rights or claims of any participating entity or representative. This MOU may not be construed as an enforceable agreement nor an exchange of consideration by the participants. This MOU may not be construed as a delegation of any authority to the representatives by their respective agencies who voluntarily participate in this MOU.

- II. Unincorporated Nonprofit Association: The Bayfield Area Trails Committee is recognized as a Wisconsin unincorporated nonprofit association under <u>Wisconsin Statute section 184.01(2) of the Uniform Unincorporated Nonprofit Association Act</u>: "a Nonprofit association means an unincorporated organization consisting of 3 or more members joined by mutual consent for a common, nonprofit purpose. However, joint tenancy, tenancy in common, or tenancy by the entircties does not, by itself, establish a nonprofit association, even if the co-owners share use of the property for a nonprofit purpose."
- III. Vision: Bayfield Peninsula trails enhance individual and community wellbeing by connecting people with nature and each other. With a focus on silent sports and inspired by a strong land stewardship ethic, we collaborate with all trail users to advance social, environmental, and economic sustainability.
- IV. Mission: To sustain and create a high-quality network of diverse trails within the Bayfield Peninsula with active community engagement and support.
- V. Goals: The goals of the Bayfield Area Trails Committee are to:

Adopt-a-Trail Roles

It's fun, good exercise and an excuse to get outside!

Purpose:

- Stewards for assigned trail sections within the BAT system
- Help to maintain a safe, high-quality experience for trail users
- Inform land managers and land owners about trail condition and usage

Primary Adopter Responsibilities:

- Visit and maintain trail sections 3x during the snow-free season: by May 15; by August 1; by October 15.
- Perform minor maintenance work such as: 1) picking up litter and
 2) removing encroaching vegetation, brush, small saplings and tree branches.



Adopt-a-Trail: Trail Reports

Trail Reporting Process:

- Submit an online Trail Report Form for each of their trail section(s) by May 15, August 1, October 15.
- Reports identify general conditions, maintenance completed and maintenance needed. Reports also identify issues that need skilled volunteers and/or land manager assistance.
- If an adopter identifies issues that require <u>immediate</u> action, beyond their capacity, they will timely notify the Trail Manager and Bayfield Area Trails via email.

Economic & Social Impact Study 2024 - 2025

OBJECTIVES

- Quantify economic impact of trail users throughout the year
- Understand community perspectives about trails
- Learn about trail user preferences to inform trails planning

IMPLEMENTATION

- Trail user surveys: July 2024 July 2025
- Online community survey: July 2025
- Online survey of trail users: July 2025
- Final report: September 2025
- * Pending Wisconsin Coastal Management Program grant

VOLUNTEERS WILL BE NEEDED

- Conduct trail user surveys throughout the year (largest # July Sept. 2024)
- 10 trailheads to be surveyed: Ashwabay, Brownstone, Big Ravine, Salmo, Jerry Jolly, Lost Creek Falls, Siskiwit Preserve, and Frog Bay



Volunteer Surveyor Roles

- A total of 300 shifts over a 12- month period
- 10 trail heads
- 2-hour shifts
- Average of 2.5 shifts/trail/month and mostly in warmer months.
- Fewer surveys in the colder/lower-use months
- Each interview takes 5-10 minutes
- Enter responses on site via an electronic notepad (provided) or personal phone
- Training provided
- Supplies: a sandwich board, hat and shirt to identify volunteer role
- Incentives for hikers to be supplied by local businesses, etc.

Achievable if enough people volunteer!



Opportunity for a broad spectrum of people

Help at your favorite trail

- Persons who have a trail in their neighborhood
- Persons who already hike a particular trail frequently
- People looking for a volunteer opportunity that is more social and requires less brawn
- Flexible scheduling: mornings or afternoons on weekdays or weekends
- People who work during the week but would like a weekend volunteer opportunity (or vice versa)
- Persons may wish to adopt a trailhead for certain time periods
- Persons who wish to get outside.

- Siskiwit Preserve: Focus on signage/mapping, and site cleanup
- . Salmo Trail: Install interpretive and orientation signs/map at trailhead kiosk.
- Big Ravine Headwaters Trails: address drainage; add boardwalks; continue moving.
- Big Ravine: Assess the potential need for bridges on the Gil Larsen Trail; West Rim Trail maintenance; replenish gravel on upper East Rim Trail.

Develop New Trails

- · Pileated Woodpecker Trail: Complete the trail.

- Big Ravine: Construct Big Ravine Sweeny Loop (if approved): link Martin Rd. to end of Chipmunk via Sweeny Ave. R/W.
- · Fire Hill: Assist Bayfield County with trails planning and implementation.

Plan New Trails & Secure Access

- Feasibility Study: Support Red Cliff on the TAP-funded feasibility study of trails, including Red Cliff to Bayfield link.
- Chequamegon Rd. to Salmo Trail: Pursue possible easements for a public connection to complete the Brownstone Trail.
- Big Ravine: Explore possible new trails in the Big Ravine to create loop(s).
- Potential Connections: Continue to explore potential trail connections on Bayfield Hill, Orchards, etc.
- Trails Master Plan: Work on new Bayfield Area Trails "master plan" based upon input from Trails Forum & Trail User Survey.
- Big Ravine Coordinated Plan: consider a coordinated integrated management plan with City & Town.
- Fire Hill: Initiate follow-up on interest expressed at 2023 Trails Forum about mountain biking around Fire Hill and mushing trails.

Communication & Outreach

- · Outreach: Conduct Trail User Survey and Socioeconomic Study.
- Maps: Improve availability of online map information, including QR codes, master map, and links to other trails.
- Standardization: Develop and implement standardized coordinated maps and trail directional and interpretive signage.
- Team: Recruit additional members and strengthen the CsC to be selfsustaining. Develop capacity for graphics, signage, photography, and content for website.

Build Capacity for Trail Projects

- Place an emphasis on recruiting and developing younger volunteers for longterm continuity.
- Develop and implement standard volunteer and trail adopter training.
- Develop maintenance and management standards & guidelines.

Establish a Sustainable Organization

- Maintain fiscal sponsorship with Recreation & Fitness Resources. Consider other long-term strategies.
- Work on a strategic multi-year plan with priorities.
- Develop funding needs and fundraising strategies & procedures based on priorities.
- Conduct annual Trails Forums to share information and build support
- Document roles, responsibilities of Chair & BAT Comm. procedures in the operations manual.
- Establish policies & procedures for standard project scheduling & planning: guidance, checklists, annual cycle.


GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIR

As 2023 comes to an end, I reflect on how far Bayfield Area Trails (BATs) has come since we signed the Memorandum of Understanding in 2020. I am inspired and grateful to see the community of volunteers and trail supporters who love and care for the trails. The generosity of our community and granting agencies has been overwhelming; especially in support of the bridge across Pikes Creek for the Pileated

Woodpecker Trail! In 2023, a total of over \$175,000 in donations and grants came through our BATs partners to enhance and expand the trails that we all cherish and enjoy. Some of these funds will be carried over into 2024.

As an all-volunteer organization, our success depends on people who are willing to give their time and talents. As such, the capabilities and knowledge of our volunteers continue to grow so that we are able to take on more challenging projects in a more sustainable manner. We do this by following a model of 1) Planning New Trails and Securing Access; 2) Maintaining and Building Trails; 3) Building and Sustaining Organizational Capacity; and 4) Communicating with all who are interested. Amazingly, during 2023, 45 folks volunteered on 10 projects and donated 1340 hours on field projects and 1250 hours on committees, public information/communications, and project planning and coordination. With nearly 25 adopters, our Adopt-a-Trail program is up and running smoothly to keep trails safe and clear.






